

ANS 4932 – Virtual Dairy Challenge (class# XXXXX)

September 15-October 22, virtual only, 1 credit

Meeting times will be decided among students, lecturers, and mentor

Course Description

Students in this course will participate in the NAIDC 15th Annual Southern Regional Dairy Challenge Contest, which this year will be held virtually from September 21 – October 23, 2020. The NAIDC (<http://www.dairychallenge.org>) organizes contests where students from various universities who study dairy science, learn to evaluate dairy farms and provide recommendations to help reach the farm's goals. All areas of the farm are evaluated: nutrition, reproduction, genetics, welfare, milk yield and quality, management practices, records, sustainability, human resources and economics. Usually, teams of students meet physically around a host farm, visit the farm, work through records, and provide presentations with recommendations to a set of judges. These events are educational, fun, and offer great networking opportunities with students from other schools and the allied dairy industry. UF students have participated in these events since 2003.

This fall semester, due to the coronavirus outbreak, the 2020 Southern Regional will be offered virtually. The event will begin with instructions and data distribution on Tuesday, September 22 and end with the uploading of pre-recorded team presentations and judge Q&A, the week of October 23. Weekly educational programming and team mentor meetings will be offered in between. Mentors will be recruited from the allied industry. In addition, your instructors will provide some training and offer guidance. Students in this course will participate either as a team of UF students, and/or in a team with students from other participating schools.

Prerequisite

http://www.dairychallenge.org/so_event.php (Rules and Regulations): *“Each participant in these North American Intercollegiate Dairy Challenge events must be a student in a North American educational institution that offers classes that have emphasis in dairy production. Participants must be enrolled in a program of study to meet the requirements for a bachelor’s degree or be enrolled in a dairy/animal degree or certificate granting program and have completed one year or equivalent of course work. Students, with or without a bachelor’s degree, enrolled in graduate or professional studies programs are not eligible. A student is ineligible to participate if he/she has (1) competed in the North American Intercollegiate Dairy Challenge National Contest, or (2) been an employee or paid consultant of any agricultural organization or service for which his/her duties included on-farm dairy consulting (excluding internships). A contestant may only participate/compete in two regional contests, two Dairy Challenge Academies, and one National Dairy Challenge contest. The final participant eligibility decision rests with NAIDC.”*

Course Goals

Students in this course work in a team to evaluate a dairy farm and offer recommendations for improvement. The course offers a capstone experience, integrating all aspects of dairy farming.
